Lent, the forty days that begin with Ash Wednesday, is historically a season of preparation. During Lent, candidates seeking to be baptized would be prepared during Lent, finally baptized during the Easter Vigil. For those people already baptized in the church, Lent was considered a time of baptismal renewal, a time to reexamine the baptismal call, and renew a commitment to life as a child of God.

The disciplines of Lent- prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, were seen as a way to help Christians focus on the meaning of baptism. These disciplines were meant to help individuals prepare themselves for Easter, and consider their own way of living in light of the way of Christ. Lent is most certainly a time to examine our own way of living, but it is not meant to be a time where we dwell only on sorrow, or force our worship into sadness.

During this season of Lent, we will be focusing on "The Road Not Taken", the way that makes all the difference- the Way of the Cross. Each Sunday we will learn about new ways of being Christians in the world, ways of humility and truth, ways of danger and homecoming. Our Wednesday night Lenten gatherings will be our "Road-Trips" into places in our history where we learn about God's hope and salvation for God's people through time.

Please join us in experiencing these new roads during our Lenten journey. As the Frost poem says, *the road less traveled by has made all the difference*. The Way of The Cross has made all the difference.

SHROVE TUESDAY

INTRODUCING E. L. W.

During the month of January, we have begun to use the new *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* hymnal (ELW). The hymns are being selected from the hymnal and we are beginning to learn the first setting that begins on page 94.

The first part of the ELW contains the following information about the structure and special services to be used throughout the year:

- Calendar showing Sundays and Principal Festivals and the Lesser Festivals and Commemorations throughout the year. (pages 14-17)
- Propers $\frac{3}{4}$ List of lessons for the three-year cycle and the prayer of the day for each of the Sundays and Principal Festivals (pages 18-53). We are using the "C" cycle for the 2006-2007 church year. List of Lesser Festivals (pages 54-59), Commemorations (pages 59-61), and Occasions (pages 61-63).
- Prayers for Worship $\frac{3}{4}$ Offering Prayer, Thanksgiving at the Table, Thanksgiving at the Font (pages 64-71).
- Additional Prayers $\frac{3}{4}$ Worship, The Church, Congregational Life, Mission, Civic Life, Government, Nations, Social Ministry, Stewardship, Creation, Life Passages, Daily Life, Affirmation of Christian Vocation, Healing, and Spiritual Life (pages 72-87)
- Holy Communion $\frac{3}{4}$ Pattern for Worship $\frac{3}{4}$ "The basic pattern of this service - gathering, word, meal, sending - is a structure that allows for freedom and flexibility in the ways worship may be shaped locally, while focusing on what the church holds in common. The whole people of God are joined by the same gifts of grace, for the sake of the same mission for the gospel, into the life of the one triune God." (pages 91-93)

- Holy Communion $\frac{3}{4}$ Setting One begins on page 94. The rubrics (instructions) are printed in red and smaller print. The rubric instructs what the worshiper, Pastor, and/or Assisting Minister should do and gives us the alternatives that may be used. Currently we are using *Sundays and Seasons* for the Confession and Offertory Prayer in the service and the service is being printed in the bulletin with the exception of The Great Thanksgiving. (pages 94-115)

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING

It was a terrific month for the Irving Park Lutheran "Return to Sender" World War II letters program.

Thanks to the Internet, directory assistance and word-of-mouth, IPLC has been able to return letters to 53 families (as of Jan. 19). We're still trying to track down the remaining 187 WWII "correspondents" whose letters were discovered last fall in a storage area. There were more than 1,000 letters in the collection.

The return of the letters has been deeply appreciated by the veterans and their families. Widows, children, nieces and nephews have all been especially thankful to receive the treasures that give an insight into what their family members were going through during WWII

Letters have worked their way back to many destinations outside of Illinois, including California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin.

Now that we're moving into February, here's just a few highlights of what was happening at IPLC 65 years ago – less than two months after the bombing of Pearl Harbor – as relayed in the "Tidings" of February 1942:

* Thirteen more names were added to the list of IPLC members who joined the military, bring the total to 55.

* Plans were being made to collect books and bake cookies (the "Cookie Jar Campaign") to send to "Our Boys" as they were known.

* The "Our Boys" Service Flag was dedicated on Feb. 22. The service attracted a capacity audience that filled the sanctuary and the auditorium. The drum and bugle corps of Cub Scout Pack 2863 was among the featured musicians. After the service, Part II of the program moved over to the five-year-old Educational Building, where a play performed by the Religious Drama Guild, musical entertainment and the showing of pictures of "our Boys" in Service (including those who served in World War I) were displayed in a slide show. Part III including an address by Chaplain E.F. Redman and the unfurling of the Service Flag. The flag was sewed by Mrs. Amanda Magnuson, who also sewed the World War I Service Flag 25 years earlier.

FINE ARTS - FEBRUARY 27, AT 2:00 PM, CHRISTOPHER LAUGHLIN, GUITAR

Christopher Laughlin was born in 1958 and raised in the Chicago suburb of Park Forest, Illinois. He began his guitar studies at the age of 14 with Richard Pick in Chicago. He attended the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore, earning a Bachelor of Music degree in 1980. In 1984 he received a Master of Music degree from Yale University. On finishing his studies at Yale he was awarded a Fulbright grant and an Annette Kade Scholarship to study in Paris with Uruguayan guitarist Betho Davezac. He continued his studies for a second year on a scholarship from the French government.

In 1985, while still living in Paris, Laughlin made a short concert tour of Tunisia under the auspices of the United States Information Service. The success of these concerts established a long-lasting relationship between Laughlin and the U.S.I.S. that has resulted in four international tours and performances in the following countries: Portugal, Greece, Morocco, Tunisia, Egypt, Israel, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, Doha, Pakistan, India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Thailand, the Philippines, Singapore, Haiti, Austria, The Czech Republic, Romania, Cyprus, Yugoslavia, Ghana, Benin, Cameroon, and Bolivia.

Also while living in Paris, Laughlin won prizes in two international guitar competitions, those of the village of Sable-Sur-Sarthe, in 1986, and of the Union des Femmes

Artistes Musiciennes, in 1985.

Christopher returned to Chicago in 1986. Since then he has soloed with the Chicago Chamber Orchestra, St. Joseph Pro Musica, the Symphony of the Shores, Westshore Symphony, the LaPorte County Symphony, and the Northwest Chicago Symphony and also with the Symphony String Quartet. He has made numerous live broadcasts on Chicago's WFMT radio, including three Dame Myra Hess Memorial Concerts, two Continental Bank Concerts, and five "Live from Studio 1" broadcasts. He also frequently gives recitals in the Chicago area.

Christopher has been a featured performer at colleges, universities, and small communities throughout the Midwest region since then. He has also performed recitals in Los Angeles, Minneapolis, Milwaukee, Baltimore, Ann Arbor, Toledo, Washington, and New Haven, CT. His recitals have been broadcast on radio stations KUSC-Los Angeles, WETA-Washington, and all across North America on the WFMT satellite network. He has released two recordings on Peregrine Records, *Danza!* (1994) and *Simplicio* (1998).

Christopher Laughlin teaches at his Glenview, Illinois studio, and at the Wisconsin Conservatory of Music in Milwaukee.

Every February, across the country, candy, flowers, and gifts are exchanged between loved ones, all in the name of St. Valentine. But who is this mysterious saint and why do we celebrate this holiday? The history of Valentine's Day -- and its patron saint -- is shrouded in mystery. But we do know that February has long been a month of romance. St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. So, who was Saint Valentine and how did he become associated with this ancient rite? Today, the Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred.

One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men -- his crop of potential soldiers. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons where they were often beaten and tortured.

According to one legend, Valentine actually sent the first 'valentine' greeting himself. While in prison, it is believed that Valentine fell in

love with a young girl -- who may have been his jailor's daughter -- who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter, which he signed 'From your Valentine,' an expression that is still in use today. Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories certainly emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic, and, most importantly, romantic figure. It's no surprise that by the Middle Ages, Valentine was one of the most popular saints in England and France.
