CONSECRATION SUNDAY AND RALLY DAY ARE COMING

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's stewardship committee has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, culminating with members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and congregational council members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

KOINONIA LEADERSHIP TEAM REPORT

In October of last year, a team of five members (*Cindy Kuhn, David Hall, Larry Lundquist, Simeon Stumme, and Chris Richard*) and Pastor Petersen were tapped to learn and apply a new church planning and leadership program designed to help congregations be more focused and effective in carrying out Christ's mission both in the congregation and out in the mission field. Fortunately, the team entered this process from a position of strength – our congregation has a remarkable track record of strong leadership, financial viability, program planning and community service.

In fact, the first stage of our process, which is coming to a close, was to ensure the preservation of the congregation's foundation by thoroughly understanding our enduring values and defining what God has called our congregation to do (our purpose). We reviewed and researched past reports and mission statements and the demographics of our community and our congregation; gathered input from our community and our members, and tapped into recent research on churches and the state of religious life in the US. These findings, which we share with you in this report, have helped shape our understanding of Irving Park Lutheran's Core Values and Purpose which in turn underpin our current Mission Statement - Inviting in Christ's Name, Proclaiming the Gospel, Living in Fellowship, Caring for Others.

KEY FINDINGS

National Trends in Religious Affiliation

Nationally, church attendance has steadily decreased over the past two decades. In the most recent Pew Research, 33% of those surveyed said they never attended church.

Recent research also indicates that "traditional" belief in God and worship practices are changing. While traditional church attendance and those who describe themselves as religious has declined, there has been an increase in those attending multiple churches as well as those describing themselves as spiritual and religious (but not always connected to a specific denomination or theology).

The chart below captures how "religious" and "spiritual" are often defined in surveys of the general public. In the middle column are common descriptions attributed to IPLC by those we surveyed. Interestingly, those who describe themselves as spiritual are seeking experiences that are common attributes of IPLC among both members and non-members.

This intersection of what IPLC already offers and what many are seeking provides us opportunities to be a place where people can raise questions, experience worship, prayer and community while learning theology and spiritual practices that ground them in the Word and Sacraments.

Trends in Our Community

Within our immediate community (1-2 mile radius), we see a relatively diverse urban neighborhood. The neighborhoods to the west of us are largely white, while we have seen a marked increase in Hispanic residents especially to our immediate north and east, which also includes a larger population of African-Americans. Our neighbors are primarily working class (with a large segment of working poor and households who qualify for free school lunches) to solidly middle class. Education levels range from 20-40% with college degrees with pockets throughout our surrounding area of higher education/higher incomes. With the proximity to public transportation, our community includes transitional and homeless people. We know that the recent housing crisis has affected many of our neighbors in that foreclosures have increased in the community.

Our surrounding community has strong neighborhood associations and a good network of social services that focus on our immediate community. There are a variety of religious denominations in the neighborhood, including Protestant (Baptist, Methodist, Episcopalian), storefront churches, Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Muslims. IPLC is the largest Lutheran church in our immediate area.

Trends and Insight into Our Congregation

Turning our review inward, we assessed our membership and activities. The majority of our membership comes largely from a 1-

2 mile radius (60641, 60618, 60630, 60634, 60647) encompassing West Walker, Old Irving Park, Portage Park, Roscoe Village, Albany Park, and Jefferson neighborhoods. Despite our members' proximity to the church, our racial and economic make-up — while somewhat diverse_— is not wholly representative of the neighborhood at large. Our membership is largely Caucasian; college educated; and strongly middle class (which in affect is middle upper class in our urban setting). There is a strong core of teaching/education professionals among our members.

Membership at Irving Park Lutheran is growing, with the increase coming mostly from families with children. However, worship attendance is the same (relatively stable) and includes regular attendees who are not members. While there is a reported increase in Sunday School attendance at other churches in the neighborhood, IPLC Sunday School attendance has remained flat in recent years. Our members/worship attendees largely became aware of IPLC from existing members, friends and neighbors in the community.

We asked both members and non-members about our programs and activities and the role our church plays in the community. We found that:

- Members most value (in order of importance): worship, music groups, IP Food Pantry support, Fine Arts Concerts
- Non members most value (in order of importance): IP Food Pantry support, Magic Mushroom, Three Brothers Community Garden, sports & fitness activities
- The influence of the Pastor (past and present) is important in how IPLC is perceived
- Members and Non members had slightly different views as to the most important thing a church should do. List appears in order of most important to least important:

- Members are more likely than non-members to believe the IPLC performs well in worship, preaching and learning; both members and non-members say IPLC performs well in directly helping those in need.
- Most members and non-members are not familiar with other youth activities (e.g., Magic After School Place) outside Magic Mushroom
- Alternative worship opportunities are not well-known

We also asked both members and non-members to comment on our core values, and we invited members to provide thoughts on our purpose. Here are some common themes:

- Strong fellowship family/friends
- Involvement/participation in worship, activities
- Progressive Christian perspective
- Strong focus on education/youth

- Place/home to remember, experience, rejoice and share God's grace and love
- Trusted source/place to learn/understand how I believe

The team's next step is to use all of this information and insight to define and refine IPLC core values and purpose. This will be shared with the Council as well as the congregation for input and comment. Then comes the fun part -- channeling our core values, purpose and our key strengths into identifying a vision and goals that will fulfill God's purpose for our community of faith. We will be seeking more input and ideas, so stay tuned!

FINE ARTS OCTOBER DATE CHANGED TO SEPTEMBER 18TH

Previously announced as October 2 Ben Melsky will

present a harp recital on September 18 at 2:00 pm.

Harpist Ben Melsky is originally from Evanston where he started playing the harp at age eight. He holds both Bachelor's of Music and Master's of Music from Northwestern University graduating with String Program Honors and a Minor of Musicology. As a soloist, he has performed



at the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C. as part of the Millenium Stage Conservatory Project, was a 2008 winner of the Northwestern University Concerto Competition with Alberto Ginastera's Harp Concerto, and has performed major concerti with the Instituto Cervantes Orchestra of Chicago, Northwestern University Chamber Orchestra, Middletown Symphony Orchestra, Southern Illinois Summer Music Festival, and Music Institute of Chicago's World's Fair Concert Series. Recently he was recorded at the Goodman Theater for their production of Animal Crackers.

As an orchestral musician he currently plays second harp with the Lyric Opera of Chicago, and has played with the Chicago Philharmonic, Illinois Philharmonic Orchestra, Southern Illinois Summer Music Festival Orchestra, Evanston Symphony Orchestra, Classical Symphony Orchestra, Northern Illinois University Symphony, Music Academy of the West Festival Orchestra and FullScore Orchestra.

He currently maintains a private studio in addition to being an associate faculty member at Glenbrook South and Glenbrook North High Schools. His studio is open to all ages, abilities and interests.

Ben has studied with Elizabeth Cifani, Alison Attar, Kayo Ishimaru, and Carl Johnson and has participated in master classes with Marcia Dickstein, Jana Bouskgova, and Sarah Bullen.

RETURN TO SENDER

In the church's collection of World War II letters, two were written by Pvt. Dorris Larson of the Women's Army Corps. While many of our letter writers' stories have been relatively easy to follow, there appears to be more to Pvt. Larson's story than meets the eye.

Her first letter was written Nov. 10, 1943, while she was stationed at Daytona Beach, Fla. On the envelope, she clearly wrote her first name as "Doris" and she signed that letter "Mrs. Verne Larson."

But by the time she wrote her second letter, 13 months later in Paris, France, she had added another letter to her first name and signed it "Dorris Larson."

Could it be two different people writing the letters? After checking with our Return to Sender Handwriting Analysis Expert (also known as Karen Greenslade ... and yes, it's an unpaid position), it was determined without a doubt that the letters were written by the same person.

So we checked our 1938 IPLC directory, and there is neither a Doris C. Larson nor a Dorris C. Larson. But to further muddy the waters, there is a Doris V. Larson listed at 5025 N. Kennison.

To add to the intrigue, our box of letters included a copy of an article about Private First Class Dorris C. Larson that appeared on the front page of the Irving Park News on Nov. 24, 1944.

The fascinating article delved into her career as a switchboard operator for the Signal Corps, including her time working on the "general's switchboard." It was her responsibility to put through cross-channel calls for General Dwight D. Eisenhower and General John C.H. Lee, deputy commander for the European Theater of Operations.

"The first time I put through a call for General Eisenhower, he made the call himself," Larson told the Irving Park News. "He said, 'Please see that I'm not cut off, operator, the connection on this call was broken last night.' I was so nervous I could hardly plug in the line, but it went through without a hitch. He's very pleasant, but he's exacting, too."

The article said she was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.S. Knowles of 4924 W. Newport Ave., but it made no reference to her marriage to Verne Larson. There also is no mention of the Knowles family in our church directories.

The mystery gets deeper because her second letter to Pastor Joshua Oden, written in Paris on Dec. 17, 1944, makes no reference to Verne Larson and doesn't mention her conversation with General Eisenhower. Go figure ... and stay tuned.

We'll print Pvt. Larson's second letter that she wrote to Pastor Oden in the October edition of the Tidings.

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING

Was it really 40 years ago?

If you're a longtime member of Irving Park Lutheran Church, 1971 probably seems like yesterday. If you're under 45 or a "newer" member, you undoubtedly don't remember an important period that brought IPLC a new pastor and a new parsonage.

The Rev. G. Erik Hagg served IPLC as vice pastor for the first nine months of 1971. Pastor Hagg, who was pastor at Nebo Lutheran Church at 3819 N. Menard from 1960-69, took over after the Rev. Kenneth E. Farb ended his 12-year run as IPLC pastor.

In March, IPLC extended a call to the Rev. Earl Carlson of Kewanee, Ill., to become the new full-time pastor. But the call was rejected.

About six months later, on Sunday, Sept. 26, 1971, the Rev. Ross Henry Larson officially was installed as the new pastor of IPLC. The installation ceremony marked the end of the nine-month ministry of Pastor Hagg.

Pastor Larson came to IPLC from Reen Memorial Lutheran Church in St. Louis. He stayed for 15 years before leaving IPLC in 1986.

Also in the summer of 1971, another member of the ministry team left IPLC. The Rev. Jim Pohl had completed his two-year term as assistant pastor.

In addition to the ministry shuffle, IPLC also demolished the original parsonage in May of 1971. Today, the "new" parsonage is almost 40 years old.

When Pastor Larson was going through the call process, he declined to comment about what he envisioned for the new parsonage. Pastor Hagg was impressed by Pastor Larson's wisdom in letting the Church Council decide what should be included in the new parsonage.

"Remember," Pastor Hagg wrote in the Tidings. "It will always be a parsonage, not a Larsonage."
